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AIA UK 2011 Annual Summer Gala

The AIA UK Chapter held its annual summer gala on the evening of 29th June, 2011 at the stunning Saatchi Gallery in Chelsea, London. The Saatchi Gallery has been at its new location since 2008 - inside the Duke of York's Headquarters off the King's Road, where the former Drill Hall has been stripped back to its shell to provide fifteen interconnected galleries on three levels. Allford Hall Monaghan Morris, the renovation architects, created minimal spaces where the art can be viewed with the architecture, both old and new, receding into the background. The setting provided the perfect backdrop for our annual summer event!

For those of you who are unfamiliar with the Saatchi Gallery, it was founded in 1985 by Charles Saatchi, the founder of advertising company Saatchi & Saatchi. He is also a sponsor for the Young British Architects, which includes artists such as Damien Hirst and Tracy Emin. His support for modern art which pushes boundaries and challenges artistic standards is manifested in his gallery as the exhibitions are always quite unique and in some cases, controversial as well. Saatchi bought and displayed one of Tracy Emin's most famous pieces, 'My Bed', which was shortlisted for the Turner Prize in 1999 and is currently on display in his own home.

The AIA UK Chapter is excited to announce that the Annual Student Design Charrette will be held on Saturday, 22 October 2011 at The Architectural Association (Bedford Square, central London) - who have kindly agreed to be the host venue again this year.

The annual charrette is a lively opportunity for students to 'limber up' early in the -academic year, as well as for recent graduates to revisit the experiences of the one-day design exercise. This year the AIA has coordinated with the British Institute of Interior Design to open the event to interior design students as well as architecture students. Participants will design collaboratively in teams of around 6 to 8 students, mentored by a seasoned practicing architect or interior architect.

This year's theme challenges students to explore how architectural form can create both expressive and rich interior spaces which heighten one's understanding of an overall concept or idea. The students will have access to a wide range of materials and large format printing thanks to the generous support of Callprint, who has been sponsoring this event for the last several years. At the end of the afternoon, team submissions will be discussed publicly, and prizes will be awarded to the three most compelling schemes by a jury chaired by Paul Finch OBE.

As in past years we are looking for AIA members to take part in this exciting event by serving as mentors. By volunteering for the day you will not only be drawn in and inspired by the design enthusiasm of some truly talented students, but also earn 6 CES credits in the process. Oxford Excursion, cont.

The weekend started on Saturday morning by touring Oxford on foot, focusing on historical sites and several of the colleges within Oxford University. The tours were led by the well-spoken and enthusiastic guides - David Lewis and Jennifer Johnson, PhD students at Oxford. Sites included the Bodleian Library, Radcliffe Square and the University Church, Radcliffe Camera, Christ Church college and New College. We also visited the longest portion of the medieval city wall, dating back to the early thirteenth century. We then continued onto the Ashmolean Museum, which was renovated by Rick Mather architects and opened in 2009 and shortlisted for the 2010 Stirling Prize. The project is a stunning renovation within an incredibly complex building. Patrick Berning and Stuart Cade of RMA led the tour and gave a brief presentation on other projects by Rick Mather in Oxford including Keble College, Queens College Library and Corpus Christi College.

We ended the day at St. Catherine's College, which is truly a masterpiece of modern architecture. The tour was led by Stephen Hodder, MBE, and Stirling Prize winner in 1996. The original buildings were designed by Arne Jacobsen in the early 1960s and Stephen Hodder's firm designed the equally gorgeous extension in 2005. The design shows structural rigor and clarity, very similar to the styles of Mies and Louis Kahn. The day was concluded with evensong at Keble College and a lively Gala Dinner at the stunning Ashmolean Museum's rooftop terrace - also designed by RMA.

On Sunday, we started the day with a tour of the courtyard gardens of Oxford led by James Edgar. Gardens included New College and the world-renowned Botanic Garden. We continued onto the Florey Building, Queen's college designed by Jim Stirling. The tour and presentation were led by Alan Berman, partner of BGS architects and author of 'Jim Stirling and the Red Trilogy: Three Radical Buildings." Our lunch break was punting on the Thames, which was enjoyed by all attendees, even in the rain!

Our weekend concluded with a walking tour of the Oxford Covered Market and St. John's college. The Covered Market tour was led by conservation officers, Katharine Owens and Sarah Billam. The tour of St. John's was led by David Lewis, Phd Student and included the historic college as well as the modern Kendrew Quadrangle, designed by MJP Architects.

13 credits were available for the weekend excursion, so in two days, attendees could fulfil over half of their AIA CES credits. The early-bird price of £99 for food and tours proved to be quite a bargain! Everyone seemed to thoroughly enjoy themselves and the AIA UK chapter is looking forward to hosting its next city excursion in the fall 2012. We welcome all suggestions!

AIA UK Building Tours

Monthly building tours have continued into the fall, providing opportunities to visit unique buildings and sites around the capital. These tours provide practical knowledge concerning London specific issues, as well as units of CES / CPD accreditation. Recent tours have included Grimshaw's St. Botolph Building and Pottersfield Park Pavilions and Snowfields by DSDHA.

In September, the AIA UK hosted a London walking tour, which was conducted by Paul Hyett of HKS. This tour focused on the history of the Prince Regent's ambitious scheme that linked Carlton House to Regents Park. Along the way, Paul described how this masterplan was developed in the context of its pragmatic response to waning monarchical powers and great buildings engineering projects and institutions of the 19th and 20th centuries.

On September 20th , we held a tour of the award-winning London Library by Haworth Tompkins. This tour investigated the bold architectural response based on the client brief to incorporate half of mile of new shelving every year. While the main focus of the project is based around the Victorian Reading Room, Issue Hall and 1890s book stack, the whole site retains the feel of the bespoke, containing all the authentic idiosyncrasies of an historic institution.

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AIA UK Bike Tour

The AIA UK took its annual bike tour on Saturday, August 6th, in Southeast London. We were very lucky with the weather and we had the perfect amount of people for safe city cycling.

We explored East London to uncover the architectural legacy starting at the Docks, moving onto the regeneration efforts at St Katharine's Docks and Wapping and ending at the Thames Barrier. The cyclists tackled the cobbled streets of Wapping to see the warehouses and filled-in dock basins that lead towards Shadwell, the Wapping Project and Tobacco Dock. We were also able to see the unique work of Hawksmoor at St George in the East and rode down Cable Street towards Limehouse and Poplar to see the sharp contrast of its high street with towering Canary Wharf beyond and onto the now controversial Robin Hood Gardens. While we could recognize the difficulties of the site, a 30-year resident of the building expressed his frustration with the council's maintenance of the building and its present condition. Afterwards, we stopped for lunch in a lovely pub on the river, only to enjoy mouth-watering burgers - at least all of our cycling made up for the extra calories!

We then continued through Greenwich and had a quick view of the stunning museums and scenery in Greenwich Park. For those of you who haven't visited Greenwich Park, it's a wonderful day out with the National Maritime museum, the Royal Observatory and stunning views over the city.

After trekking down and across the Greenwich foot tunnel we rode further down the river to the O2 and took in Ravensbourne College and its distinctive patterned façade by Foreign Office Architects. We cycled onwards to view the Thames Barrier, which is much more fascinating in person. I would recommend a visit to the Thames Barrier, along with the nearby Thames Barrier Park. This was a wonderful conclusion to fantastic cycling day out!
